## SUSTAINABLY MANAGED FORESTS

Made in the U.S.A!



As our industry continues to uncover new markets for wood products, a new innovation for the use of wood in tall buildings is bringing a shift in perspective. With recent updates made to the International Building Code (IBC), mass timber is gaining momentum and energizing the architect and building communities to think outside the concrete and steel box.

One of the most exciting new breakthroughs in US construction, the application of mass timber is popping up across the landscape from coast to coast. How does that affect Sierra Pacific? Put simply, mass timber is a high-value product that is made using dimension lumber. And we make a lot of dimension lumber.

What is mass timber? Tall mass timber buildings, in contrast to concrete and steel buildings, are constructed using wood for their primary load-bearing structure. Mass timber is typically characterized by the use of large solid wood panels for wall, floor and roof construction. Tall mass timber structures still utilize concrete for central support but the use of wood panels significantly reduces the overall weight of the building allowing for smaller footings and remarkably reduced concrete use. These panels are made by bonding several layers of lumber or plywood. Unlike other forms of wood construction, it is generally cut-tosize at an off-site location and then assembled and installed at the construction site. Examples of mass timber include Cross Laminated Timber (CLT), Structural Composite Lumber, gluedlaminated timber (glulam), and large section sawn lumber. On page four, see how CLT and glulam are made and check out photos of recent US mass timber projects.

While Sierra Pacific is not manufacturing mass timber, we are supplying other manufacturers with lumber for their panels, beams, and columns. By doing so, we are expanding our market reach in a relatively new supply chain with a growing demand. The potential market benefit does not stop on the lumber side of our business. With its glass wall systems, Sierra Pacific Windows also has new opportunities to add value and powerful focal points to mass timber architecture.

# STANDING TALL FOR MASS TIMBER

Another feature of mass timber structures is their ability to be designed with exposed wood on the interior as well as the exterior, giving them a unique appearance compared to other construction materials. It is important to note that the tallest of these buildings, while showcasing the look of wood, do still require some measure of exterior noncombustible cladding. Even so, when architects couple the features of mass timber with wood windows, doors and wall systems, the visual beauty and inviting warmth remains unmatched in modern design.

The mass timber idea is not new. Europe had been using mass timber for at least 20 years, while the first commercial CLT building in the U.S. was constructed in 2011. Since that first success story, suppliers, builders and architects have been working to expand mass timber's acceptance and inclusion in U.S. building codes. Many of the industry organizations with whom Sierra Pacific is affiliated, such as the American Wood Council (AWC) and the Softwood Lumber Board (SLB), have dedicated resources to testing and documenting fire safety, structural integrity and mass timber's ability to withstand natural disasters such as earthquakes and hurricanes.

Because of their strength and dimensional stability, mass timber products offer a renewable, sustainable and carbon-friendly alternative for building applications where wood hasn't always been considered. Increased use of mass timber also improves markets for lumber, including lower grade lumber. This means traditionally lower value lumber – which could come out of the less healthy, overly-dense California forests that have been susceptible to drought, disease and catastrophic wildlife – has a new market providing more value.

As we see several new mass timber building projects on the horizon across the country, we can be optimistic about the opportunities Sierra Pacific has to be an active partner in this market. # **JUMPING IN TO RESTORE A BIT OF HISTORY**

Both Sierra Pacific Industries and Windows jumped in as a community partner to help preserve and restore the historic White Sulphur Springs Ranch in Clio, California near our Quincy mill. With SPI Quincy framing lumber and beautiful windows from Sierra Pacific Windows Red Bluff, SPI-donated materials will be integral parts of the community pool and bathhouse that are being returned to the ranch. The bathhouse is part of an overall restoration effort at the ranch and the planned ADA swimming facility will accommodate all users, including children and the disabled. Construction of these projects began in late December. Businesses from Redding, Reno, Quincy, Truckee and Clio all contributed the necessary building materials and labor.



The ranch came into existence in 1852, operating for more than century as a working ranch, hotel and venue for community events and recreation. Since 2010, the ranch has operated under the guidance of the Mohawk Valley Stewardship Council (MVSC.) The pool project is part of a broader effort to fully store the ranch as a community resource, including small museum, hiking and biking trails, gardens, and an amphitheater for events. MVSC's mission aligns with the Sierra Pacific Foundation, as it works to connect people with their natural and cultural heritage, promote healthy lifestyles, and cultivate community engagement. With a focus on utilizing local resources, this project will undoubtedly breathe life back into this historic place in the heart of Plumas County and increase capacity for the benefit of current and future generations.

# SPI SEEKS ENDANGERED SPECIES ACT ALLOWANCE FOR SPOTTED OWLS IN CA

SPI is working with U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service and California Department of Fish & Wildlife to obtain an Endangered Species Act permit for California and northern spotted owls that occupy SPI's California forests. As a part of the permit application, SPI developed a Habitat Conservation Plan (HCP) in collaboration with the USFWS, CDFW and US Forest Service. If approved, the permit will provide long-term management certainty across SPI's 1.6 million acres of sustainably-managed California timberland.

The HCP incorporates information gained over 30 years of research. Spotted owl populations on SPI's lands have remained stable, with SPI's active management providing a mosaic of forest stands that meet spotted owls' habitat needs. We also know how catastrophic wildfire impacts nesting habitat for owls and other species.

SPI is making a long-term commitment to spotted owl conservation, with measures including:

- increasing potential habitat areas across the landscape over time,
- protecting habitat at known owl activity centers by limiting habitat modification near nesting sites and within activity centers, and
- minimizing the size and rate of spread of wildfire by establishing a system of fuel breaks and a network of fuels reduction projects across the landscape, through a partnership with US Forest Service, CalFire and others.

The draft permit application will be made available for the public review this Spring. Following the public comment period, SPI will work with the agencies to address public comments, with the goal of securing a final permit this Fall.



# COMPANY CONTRIBUTION

A pool of money that Sierra Pacific creates each year.
This is shared among eligible crew members based on hours worked, years of service, and earnings for the year.

#### 401(k) MATCH

The amount that Sierra Pacific contributes to your retirement, up to \$1,750, by matching what you put into your 401(k) during the year.

#### WHAT IS VESTING?

For Company Contribution and Match, vesting is the amount you are entitled to receive if you leave employment. Vesting is progressive, starting from 20% vested (2 years of service) to 100% vested (6 years of service).




In 2019's first issue, the article dedicated to highlighting Red's career is titled "Life Made of Timber" and is truly successful in capturing the humble and resourceful nature of Sierra Pacific's Chairman Emeritus. Not one to ever seek the spotlight, Red may not personally enjoy the attention this honor has brought, but as part of the extended SPI family we all celebrate Red's legacy, experience and success.

And Red, in true fashion, is quick to share one of the keys to the company's success. "We've been lucky in that we've hired a lot of good people, and they've had a lot to do with our success." Red goes on to explain he's always tried "to be honest with people, keep up with them personally and respect them and reward them well." A "life made of timber" - a life well-lived indeed.

# **SPOTLIGHT ON SUCCESS: THE WILD LIFE**

In 2006, Amanda Shufelberger applied to Sierra Pacific for a fire patrol opening on the Weaverville district. She did not get that job but she was encouraged to continue pursuing opportunities with the company. On March 5, 2007, Amanda joined the SPI family as a wildlife biologist serving initially on both the Stirling and Tahoe forestry districts but now focusing all her efforts on Tahoe.

Before joining the Sierra Pacific team, Amanda gained experience by working in various jobs with several government agencies. Sierra Pacific was her first private forestry industry job. She describes: "When I joined SPI, I didn't really know that I'd be embarking on my full career. At the agencies, you move around all the time. Different agencies, different departments, different locations. I just didn't anticipate being with one company in one role for 12 years and I love it! I am doing my dream job and I love what I do."

Being part of the SPI family really means something to Amanda. She explains: "There's not a lot of turnover at SPI. Your colleagues really do become your family. You work side by side. You see their kids grow up. It is such a family environment and the level of engagement by the Emmerson family with all of us is such a part of that."

One of the highlights of Amanda's career is her discovery and tracking of Buddy the Wolverine, which has also provided a platform for something she enjoys: sharing with the public the hard science and field work in which SPI engages. In 2008, an unexpected species showed up on a motion detection camera that had been placed north of Truckee, California as part of a carnivore documentation

effort SPI started in 2006. Wolverines had not been documented in California since the 1920s, so when this one lone male appeared, it was BIG

NEWS. Amanda named him Buddy and SPI has been the only company to document the occurrence of him every year between 2008 and his last known detection in 2018.

# "WE ARE ACTUALLY CHANGING PEOPLE'S PERCEPTION OF WILDLIFE AND MANAGED TIMBERLANDS"

Amanda enjoys educating community organizations and schools regarding how Sierra Pacific approaches sustainable forest management. When she started, she was one of four biologists. Now there are 11 across SPI's ownership. "Because of all the cutting edge research we've been doing on species like the spotted owl and the fisher, along with all of our day to day field work, SPI is finally getting the recognition and respect from others in the scientific community," she explains. "We are actually changing people's perception of wildlife and managed timberlands. Most are surprised at the survey work that goes into the THP process before a tree is even harvested."

Perhaps its Amanda's perspective on just how fortunate she is to be doing what she loves that motivates her to share her joy with others where she sees an opportunity. This past December, Amanda found such an opportunity and shared the gift of life - with a stranger. She donated one of her two healthy kidneys to someone she doesn't know but hopes to soon meet.

Amanda had heard about living donation and started doing her research. She contacted UC Davis Medical Center in Sacramento and began the process of giving the gift of life. "The beauty of what I'm doing is that it's creating a 'chain donation,'" said Amanda. "I'm called a non-directed donor because my kidney didn't go to someone I chose. But it kicks off a chain, and I'm told four people are getting kidneys in the chain. All are from Northern California." Amanda says her only regret is that she doesn't have more kidneys to give and she would absolutely do it again.

Success comes in many forms. Amanda is a shining example of success in all its possible ways: fulfillment, dedication and joy in both her career and her personal life.
